JEHOVAH-SHAMMAH: THE LORD IS THERE

Introduction

We must never take for granted the privilege of standing in the presence of the Almighty. The inhabitants of heaven are eternally blessed to be in the glorious presence of Jehovah-Shammah, while those who have rebelled against Him occupy a different fate.

Ichabod cautions us to earnestly seek and cherish God's presence in our lives, lest we find ourselves spiritually barren and devoid of His glory.

4. The Ultimate Revelation of Jehovah-Shammah: Jesus Christ

In the fullness of time, God manifested Himself in the flesh through His Son, Jesus Christ truly the ultimate expression of Jehovah-Shammah. **1 Timothy 3:16 (KJV)** emphasizes this incredible truth: "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory."

Jesus walked among us as the incarnate Word, bringing heaven to earth. Wherever He went, the reality of God's presence was apparent. He healed the sick, raised the dead, restored lives, and brought peace to the troubled.
